

Colleagues:

This email message is long. I wanted to be brief. But, I also wanted to be complete.

While I believe everyone will benefit from the information in my message, the primary target audience is faculty who will teach in Fall 2020 and who wonder whether they should adopt Canvas or use eCampus (Blackboard). The purpose of the message is to provide the information I currently have available to facilitate your decision making process.

## Background – Canvas Selection and Implementation

In January 2020, the university announced the selection of a new learning management system (Canvas). Prior to Spring Break 2020, the envisioned implementation timeline for Canvas included a small pilot (about 100 courses) for Fall 2020, a broader scale adoption (about 500 courses) in Spring 2021, and full scale adoption for Fall 2021.

During Spring Break 2020, the pandemic spread of the COVID-19 virus and subsequent shelter-in-place restrictions resulted in the rapid move to remote course delivery for all Spring 2020 courses. In Summer 2020, Mays faculty used (will use) remote delivery for all of their courses. For Fall 2020, course delivery will include both 100% remote delivery (synchronous and asynchronous) and face-to-face delivery (all face-to-face class session will have synchronous remote delivery).

Given the remote delivery requirements for Summer 2020 and Fall 2020 outlined above, the importance of a robust learning management system (LMS) has increased. As a result, the Office for Academic Innovation (OAI) and the LMS implementation team adjusted the envisioned Canvas implementation timeline to include a small pilot during Summer II 2020. Beginning in Fall 2020, all faculty across the university have the option to use Canvas for their courses.

The university launched a [new LMS website](#) to provide a central location for learning about the Canvas LMS and the implementation process. The new [LMS website](#) includes the revised [Keep Teaching](#) and [Keep Learning](#) website resources. As you prepare to migrate your course content to Canvas, please review the information on the [lms.tamu.edu](https://lms.tamu.edu) website for the latest information about the implementation process.

## Fall 2020 – Should I Choose Canvas or eCampus (Blackboard)?

The university [announced a set of release waves](#) for when faculty will have the option to adopt Canvas for their courses. Beginning with the Summer II 2020 session, faculty had the option to choose Canvas as

the LMS for their course. The wave model continues through the Fall 2020, Spring 2021, and Summer 2021 semesters. For those semesters, faculty will have the option to choose Canvas as the LMS for their course.

At least one faculty member in four of the five Mays academic departments has chosen Canvas as the LMS for their Summer II 2020 courses (8 – 12 total faculty members). Be sure to talk with your colleagues to learn about their experience using Canvas and the migration process.

For Fall 2020, Spring 2021, and Summer 2021, all faculty members have the option to continue using eCampus (Blackboard) as the LMS for their course. Beginning with Fall 2021, eCampus (Blackboard) will be decommissioned and all faculty will only have the option to use Canvas as the LMS for their course.

The [LMS website](#) will provide information to assist faculty in determining whether to move to Canvas or stay with eCampus (Blackboard) for Fall 2020. This website is evolving with weekly releases of information planned for Thursdays (i.e., if new content is available for the LMS website, it will be published in the weekly Thursday release).
